Begin the story by telling children to look in their pocket for a piece of imaginary bubble gum. Have children pretend to unwrap the wrapper (make a crinkling sound) and put the gum in their mouth and chew it until it is soft and gooey. Have children wad the imaginary wrapper back up and put it in their pocket. Then have children look in their other pocket to find an imaginary yo-yo. Tell children to put the yo-yo string on their finger and practice playing with the yo-yo using the word "doo-wop." After enjoying this song, talk about the impossible things Herman eats.

(use fingers to show about an inch; make this size increase with each verse until eventually your arms are spread wide)

(wiggle index finger like an inch worm)

A bug! Oooh, yuck!

But the silly Herman, he didn't say another word.

He just crawled away.

Other verses:

I swallowed a mouse! (move hand like an inch worm)

I swallowed a **kitty cat**! (wave arm)

I swallowed a **dog**! (wave both arms)

I swallowed a pig! (stretch both arms out to the side and make wave motion)

I swallowed a **cow**! (raise both arms overhead with palms together; make a full body wave motion)

On the last verse, Herman does not swallow something, he burps.

Daaaaaaa, I burped!

(make Herman size an inch again)




→ Wiggle Worm
